

year began with an unparalleled victory in the Inter-House Basketball Tournament. The team played matches against each of the three other houses and secured a win. This has never happened before—four in a row! By winning the championship game against Diamond House, we remained the defending champions. The Best Player was awarded to Muskan Tulsyan. Radhika Garg was the unbreakable pillar of the team. No one on the court that day could forget the last shot, it was a tie until the last minute, until Jhanvi made it, both teams' players missed the additional five shots. We forgot, for a moment, the pain and discomfort as we sprinted for a group hug. If I could re-live the look of pride and contentment in every Emeraldie's eyes that evening, I would.

The House also performed its best in the other sporting events. The Inter-House Athletics- one of the occasions where the whole House participates and puts in their best effort. We won the category Trophy for Grades 9 and 10. Ah! What went before the races is readily present in everyone's hearts. The sprint for glucose, the dry tongues, the heaving hearts, and the cheers and applause from the House. Navya Vohra shone throughout the events, winning gold medals in the 600 m, 400 m, and relay. Baahar Sharma won the Best Athlete in the junior category. The practices for marchpast were the highlights of the evening almost every day until Sports Day. Everyone showed the utmost dedication during the Inter-House Marchpast. The "Chak-de-Phatte" spirit during the Tug-of-War was commendable.

Sports this year went beyond imagination. Our able karate players, Priyanshi Agrawal, Jigisha Sachdeva, and Chandrika Bandhopadhyay, received the prestigious Black Belt. It was a proud moment for the school as well as the House. The athletes of Emerald House, Baahar Sharma, Avishi Goel, and Gauri Bansal, also brought laurels to the school by participating in and also winning at the District and as well as the State Athletics Meets. They also won medals in the Wynberg Allen Athletics Meet. Stanzin Edga Chosdon participated in the Woodstock Football Tournament and reached the semi-finals. Radhika Garg and Muskan Tulsyan were selected for the States Basketball Championship after the team finished as semifinalists in the District Basketball Championship. Radhika Garg eclipsed everyone when she was selected for the CISCE regional basketball championship while Asmi Agrawal was selected as a standby. The Uttarakhand team was declared champions by winning the gold medal against the teams of Ghaziabad, Lucknow, and Mehrauli.

Back to the cut-throat Inter-House competitions, Emerald House won the Design Challenge in the Middle School category. The juniors of the House worked extremely hard and collaboratively to make that a success. Even after the initial friction, we were determined to prove that we go beyond our failures. Inter-House MUN introduced new challenges. Betting on our instinct to trust a bloc from a different house and raising the stakes, gave us the willies, but it was worth it. Everyone who participated, came through. Muskan Tulsyan won the Best Delegate and the Best Position Paper award from the UNSC Committee and Saisha Arora received an Honourable Mention from UNHCR Committee. It has been a tradition for Emerald House to go all out for the house boards and sometimes we succeeded, sometimes we failed, but the zest remained constant. Anushka Agrawal, a remarkable artist, was the backbone of the House and did not let anyone's hopes down. We gathered again after the Three Wise Men (iykyk) for the Little Things and it was always the little things that mattered to us.

Inter- House Music and Dance were the culmination point of the House spirit that was tucked away in a box during the pandemic. The newfound spirit was stronger and more dynamic than ever. Come what may, we were ready for it. The melody and the symphony fashioned by the singers and the instrument players were in perfect sync with the tapping feet of the dancers. The bonds formed at 4:30 a.m., wrapped in a blanket, and the exhausted smile of satisfaction, after practices, were worth more to us than winning. One moment is particularly etched in my heart. After a weak's practice performance, Navika, the youngest in the group took to a corner and practiced alone. In times of exhaustion, moments like these become our pillar of hope and strength. Radhika Garg, Tripta Sabharwal, Annie Khandelwal and Navya Agrawal stood tough and worked tirelessly to put up a strong front.

Grade 8: The Wadia Institute.

Students of Grade 8 went for an educational trip to Wadia Institute of Himalayan Geology, Dehradun on the 2nd of September to learn more about their ongoing research on the drying up of rivers and melting glaciers in India, with a focus on Climate Change.

Students met with several geologists to ask questions about the effects of climate change on melting glaciers, dwindling rivers, and their natural hazards. The students visited the Glaciology lab and Seismology lab to see how the data is collected using machines and artificial intelligence. They asked several questions from geologists about the impact of climate change on rivers. As they learned the interconnectedness of Climate Change, they are now able to make sense of how it has impacted our natural environment and our own lives as well.

As part of their exploration of Wadia Institute, students also visited the Geological Museum. They saw crystals and models of extinct animals and various kinds of rocks that were displayed in the museum. Students also saw displays of Earth's structure, Pangea (the formation of the seven continents), and the fossils found there. As a result, this trip provided the students with valuable information and they enjoyed learning about their home planet.

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Science Educational Trip

The science students of Grades 11 and 12 visited the Council of Scientific and Industrial Research-Indian Institute of Petroleum (CSIR-IIP) on 3rd September 2022. They were taken to a Distillation Lab where the process of fractional distillation of crude oil was explained in detail. This was followed by a visit to the Biotech Lab where the scientist explained the formation of organic sweetener from bagasse, its properties, and its uses. As Nuclear Magnetic Resonance (NMR) has become a permanent technique for determining the structure of organic compounds, the students also visited the NMR section where they were shown the magnetic nature of the electron of ethyl alcohol.




Students of Grade 8 went for an educational trip to Wadia Institute of Himalayan Geology, Dehradun on the 2nd of September to learn more about their ongoing research on the drying up of rivers and melting glaciers in India with a focus on Climate Change.

Students met several geologists to interview and had an active discussion on the effects of climate change on melting glaciers, dwindling rivers, and natural hazards. The students visited the glaciology lab and seismology lab to see how the data is collected using machines and artificial intelligence.
